

Hair should be neat and properly up for class. It is just as important as a school or sport uniform. Having your hair in a bun is a part of ballet class etiquette.



Cover with hair net

Tuck the end under the outside coil and pin.


The pins will work best if they catch both the underside of the bun and the hair closest to the head.

With very long or very thick hair, split the pony tail in half, make a bun with one half and then twist the other half around the outside of the bun, keep it flat to the head.

Use hair pins like these ...

Character shoes must be worn for graded exams. and These are available in two heel sizes – low heel in sizes 3 – 7 (including half sizes) and Cuban in sizes 2 – 8 (including half sizes).
